
October, 2024

As we prepare for the glorious colours of autumn I found this fascinating snippet on the Met Office website (www.metoffice.gov.uk):



Chlorophyll is the chemical which makes tree leaves green and as it declines other chemicals become more prominent in the leaves.

These are responsible for the vibrant ambers, reds and yellows of autumn. The chemicals responsible are types of flavonoids, carotenoids and anthocyanins.

Did you know some of these chemicals are the same ones that give carrots (beta-carotenes) and egg yolks (luteins) their colours?



Ovington Fuel Trust

Most Norfolk villages have a "Fuel Trust" not everyone knows how they came about. In the 1800s the government of the day passed a law called "the Enclosure Act" where wealthy landowners could fence off their land, thus the "common people" could no longer gather wood to heat their homes. The vicar of the day thought this unfair so began the first Fuel Trust. Using money from rent of homes and land he and a few trusted people used the money to buy the parishioners fuel, usually coal. This is why it is still called "The Fuel Trust". It is of course no longer just fuel.

Ovington's Fuel Trust is run by volunteers under Charity Commission regulations. We give grants to people who are struggling in the present cost of living crisis, and fuel allowance withdrawal. If you or anyone you know are in need please please get in touch. In the past we have helped with school uniforms, leaking roofs, new chimney liners, all sorts, so don't think your need is too trivial.

It will be gratefully received and taken to the food bank on the Monday.
