On Tuesday evening, 18 February, the Reverend Patrick Morrow was licensed and installed as the new Priest-in-Charge of Ashill Benefice (consisting of Ashill, Ovington, Merton and Saham Toney parishes) in a lovely service led by Bishop Jane, the Bishop of Lynne.

Many people attended from all four parishes, each parish took turns to say a personal prayer of welcome and encouragement to Patrick – our representative was Ann Johnson who delivered a very nice, heartfelt prayer. There were also messages of "Welcome" given by the "Wider Community"; Ovington Parish Councillor (and District Councillor) Pete Bate welcomed Patrick on behalf of the Parish Council and the wider community.

At the end of the service the congregation were invited to stay for refreshments and had the opportunity to speak with Patrick on a more personal level.

Introduction

Revd Patrick Morrow

I'm Patrick Morrow, and by the time you read this I will (God willing) have been licensed as Church of England Priest-in-Charge for the parishes of Saham Toney, Ashill, Ovington, and Merton. I've been looking forward to it intensely, and have already received such a warm welcome from the villages.

I am a country boy myself, growing up in rural Yorkshire (first in the East Riding, then in the North, around York, where, interestingly, it is mostly flat). So, yes, I am a proud Yorkshireman (as if there were another kind)! I did various things before ordination, studying Theology (in Durham, Dublin, and Cambridge), and working in retreat houses, and as a health care assistant in a forensic psychiatric hospital.

After training in Cambridge, and a curacy in Lincoln, I moved to London. Here I had a variety of roles at different times, including parish work in Camberwell, in the South, and Manor Park, in the East, and chaplaincy in two universities, and, again, a psychiatric hospital. I also worked for the Council of Christians and Jews. Jewish-Christian Relations, and interfaith relations more broadly, have long been special interests. I'd love to take a group to a synagogue and a mosque in the wider area at some point. I know we'd get a great welcome.

Another personal interest is languages, including Biblical Hebrew and Greek. I lived in Hamburg for a year after A Levels, and was delighted to find last year, at a conference in Salzburg, that I can still communicate in German. I love both music and poetry. At least historically(!), I have been a competent singer, and I read a poem a day, and try to write at least one a month.

I've had a connection with this part of Norfolk over the last four years, in that my last role was as Anglican Chaplain to HMP Wayland. Now, my earnest wish is to throw myself into the life of the villages – all of which are vibrant in distinctive ways. It is important that I am up front in saying that my parish role is half time, and I will have a second string to my bow, as mental-health chaplain. So please do not read anything into my being absent from some important events. It is how it has to be. My prayers for you – as people and as communities – are already constant.

The vernal equinox occurs on Thursday, 20 March 2025, at 9:04am to be unreasonably precise. The word *equinox* comes from the Latin for equal "*equi*" and night "*nox*", so taken literally means equal night.

The name is somewhat misleading because by 20 March the sun will already be above the horizon more than it is below. There are different ways of defining sunrise and sunset, but commonly sunrise is when the first part of the sun is visible and sunset is when the last sliver disappears. Furthermore sunlight is bent by the atmosphere and by a size coincidence when you observe the sun first touching the horizon the whole disc has actually just gone below it.

The equilux (again from Latin for equal "equi" and "lux" meaning light) is a better measure of what we often expect the equinox to be.

Unfortunately the equilux is not fixed and depends on where your are on the globe, but will be about three days or so before the equinox.

Why was the Equinox so calm?

It had everything under control – day and night!

Why did the moon love the Equinox?

It felt like they had equal time to shine!

How does the Vernal Equinox greet you?

'Long time no sunshine!'
