Recipe of the month: PISTACHIO SABLES

This is a recipe given to Delia Smith by the Head Pastry Chef at the Blakeney Hotel.

Ingredients

15g Shelled Unsalted Pistachio Nuts

40g Strong White Flour, sifted

40g Unsalted Butter, diced

40g Freshly Grated Parmesan

A pinch of Cayenne Pepper

Seasoning

Method

- Chop the pistachio nuts guite small.
- Mix with all the remaining ingredients in a medium sized bowl.
- Rub all the ingredients together to form large clumps.
- Press the mixture against the sides of the bowl to bring together.
- Transfer to a board and knead lightly.
- Roll into a sausage shape about 18cm long.
- Wrap in cling film and put in the freezer for 30 minutes.
- Heat oven to 180°C/gas mark 4.
- · Grease baking tray.
- Slice the log into discs about 5mm wide and spread out on tray.
- Pop in centre of oven and bake for roughly 13-15 minutes, until they start to go golden around the edges.
- Transfer to wire rack to cool.
- Store in an airtight tin.

Recipe (and samples!) provided by Ann Johnson so I can categorically agree these are **delicious**!

Reflection about Easter

I write in early Lent. You may be reading this on Easter Day. Time flies! I am enjoying settling in as your priest-in-charge, and hugely looking forward to my first Holy Week and Easter at Saham Toney, and the other parishes in my care – Ashill, Merton, and Ovington.

So much could be said about Easter. You might expect that I'd be glum, and complain how the religious meaning of the festival – just like Christmas – has been lost. Well, I am realistic. I remember how, for me as a child, growing up way back in the 1970s, Easter was really about chocolate. My sister, brother, and I went to church – because you got a cream egg!

Or you might think that I am somewhat anxious about Easter. I mean anxious that (as happens most years) the media will uncover the hidden fact that Easter is named after a goddess, "Eostre", and she was a hare who laid eggs! So Christians imposed their own teachings onto this pagan origin, perhaps in a bullying way. I will be a plain-speaking Yorkshireman. I am not anxious. For that account, which the media so love, is garbled nonsense. It's a Victorian romantic compound invention. The roots of Easter are Christian.

I will say: even in the times of my life when I have not called myself a Christian, I have known that in the story of Jesus – the whole of his life, but especially his last days and the mystery of what happened after his death – there is something intriguing, and a clue about what counts in life. What counts in life is love. Love radiating from the Cross. Love meeting us in signs of life where all seems death. We'd love to see you at our services!

A report for the unconfirmed minutes of the meeting held on 19 March

Present: Cllrs Karen Weir (KW)(chair), David Welsted (DW), Pete Bate (PB), Jeremy Woods (JW) and Timothy Birt (TB).

In attendance: The Clerk and two members of the public

Matters arising:

- Highways The trod collapse was actioned to the furthest degree, but a hard surface won't be installed. It has been resurfaced to bring it back to the way it was.
- 2. 30 mph sign to be addressed further on.

Planning:

- PL/2025/0060/SU37: Stable Block, Shipdham, IP25 7RN; Add a third conductor to the existing overhead electricity line.
- PL/2025/0048/TRE: Thornborough, 1 Church Road,
 T10 Common Lime TPO ref. 2005 no17, Crown clean, the height of the tree will be reduced by approx 2 2.5m.

Policy Review:

Following a brief discussion about wording, the following policies were approved in line with the schedule: Standing Orders, Code of Conduct, Financial Regulations and Statement of Internal Controls.

Any Highways or Village Issues:

There was a discussion over the 41 metres of hedge that has been pulled out. The Breckland Tree & Hedgerow Officer has been out to inspect and will return to do a species assessment. It was noted that last time no action was taken despite it being deemed two criminal offences had occurred.

30 MPH sign fallen over.

The huge new field opening now opens on a blind bend and there are drainage issues nearby. TB to write up an email detailing these three issues to send to the Highways Officer and set up a meeting.

Community Table:

Information was received about the Carbrooke community table.

There is no one available at Ovington Village Hall to manage a Community Table. Ovington Village Hall are okay (with provisions) with having a Community Table on their property, but it would need to be managed properly. TB to put a note in the Oracle asking if anyone is willing to volunteer for this management position.

Litter Pick:

March 29th, 10:30 to meet at the Village Sign on The Street. Kit is booked, the risk assessment has been completed. There will be an event in the Village Hall after the Litter Pick around noon.

Adjournment for Public Participation:

- 1. The point was raised that the large gateway mentioned earlier is on a blind bend and the 30 MPH sign has been taken out which is a criminal offence.
- 2. There was a discussion on the spring well on that field which was the clean water supply for the village as well as the other wells in the village.
- 3. There was a discussion over the old Village Shop and its history over the years. Member of the public working on getting photographs of the old Village Shop. The member of the public emphasised the importance of keeping the history of the village alive.
- 4. There was a discussion over the cross roads and the speed issues.

5. A member of the public asked if Parish Council meetings could go to once a month.
