Over a period of about 100,000 years, gravitational influences, especially from the moon, change the Earth's orbital path from being nearly circular to slightly elliptical.

On <u>3 July</u> (at 20:54, because you know I like precision) we will be the furthest from the sun, known as

aphelion. The consequence for us in the northern hemisphere is a slightly longer, but slightly cooler summer on average.

The science behind the Earth's orbit was refined and developed from earlier hypothesis by Serbian geophysicist Milutin Milanković in the 1920's. A fascinating subject (maybe not for everyone) they are known as the Milankovitch cycles.

KW was elected as Chair and PB as Vice-Chair

The minutes of the Parish Council on 19 March, 2025 were approved.

Matters arising:

The Clerk updated the council on the bank charges and stated that there will be an item on the next agenda to discuss and decide switching banks as the monthly fee is unavoidable.

Revd Patrick Morrow

"Whoever sings, prays twice."

That is a phrase that has been attributed to a number of Christian thinkers, including St Augustine and Martin Luther. In truth, more than one person has surely thought it. The point is clear, and is powerful. If you sing to God, you pray with your words, and you pray with the tune. You cannot sing (or at least you cannot sing well) without listening, listening to the sound you are making, and if you are in a choir, or are accompanied, listening to the sound of others. Listening is itself a form of prayer. That's a conviction that exists throughout and beyond Christianity.

Or it may simply be that most people enjoy music. When we enjoy something, we relax, and we are more readily grateful. And thanksgiving is the most basic form of prayer. People, by and large, feel the power of music. Music can be a way to connect with powerful memories (like the sense of smell). It's quite normal to be transported back to your youth, just by hearing a few chords. I wonder which chords they are for you?

Throughout her life (and she lived into her 80s), I never saw my aunt look at a hymn book. She knew all the words to all the verses, off by heart. When I asked her how, she just said she'd be singing them since she was four. Those days are gone, I fear (and certainly I need the words in front of me), but hymns too can carry memories, as well as prayers.
