## Nicene Creed

"We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth..."

If you go or ever went to church – and by no means just the Church of England – it is likely that you recognise these words. They are from "the Nicene Creed". This can be traced back to the Council of Nicaea, which took place in modern Turkey in 325 CE, though it has some later additions. It follows that this year is the 1700 anniversary of the first universal Christian Creed or declaration of faith. This is worth reflecting on.

I believe(!) that people easily misunderstand the Creed. They think it is a string of propositions which the Church demands people assent to without evidence, or else it's a set of abstract philosophical speculations from another age, which can now be dropped without loss. On either reading, the real driving force of Christian faith and life lies elsewhere: in our songs, our prayers, in our tasks, in our wider experience.

Let us be clear that the single word we translate "we believe" does not mean "we have made the rational deduction". The original Greek means "we trust", "we place our trust in". And something similar might be said of the Latin "credo", which gives us the very word "Creed". And did you know that "believe" ultimately comes from the same root as "beloved"? This means we are free to think of the Creed as being a natural part of Christian worship. Here, we worship, by declaiming our trust in God. We might say we are singing our love song to God.

This is a long way from justifying all the words of the Nicene Creed. They include big – the biggest – claims about Jesus: Jesus is God in the way that God is God! Making sense of that is beyond this piece. It might be said that a Church is a group of people who are together exploring just what that means; how it all coheres and invites us to live in response. It might further be said that, at least when times are narrow for us, we all need someone or something to place our trust in. May you find yours!
